

- **1. Tricot/ Cotton Interlock Fabric** in your choice of skin colour. For one doll you will need a piece 50cm x 84cm wide tubular (or if you can't get tubular buy 1 metre x 42 cm wide).
- **2. Tubular Bandage 1 metre of size 6cm** per doll This is like a stretchy tube of gauze bandage and is available from doll making suppliers.
- 3. 100% Wool Stuffing approx. 500grams per doll.
- **4. 50g Skein of Wool/ Yarn for hair** you can use any wool/ yarn for the hair as I will be sharing a very easy hair technique. If you want your doll to have lovely "life-like" hair I suggest buying a mohair type hair specifically for doll making. Winterwood (Australia) & Little Oke Doll (UK) sell some lovely options.
- **5. Thick Tying Cotton** this will be used for contouring the head you can buy thick cotton specifically for doll making or you can use a knitting wool/ yarn.
- **6. A Strong Cotton** in a colour tone similar to your doll skin fabric. My favourites are Gutermann Quilting Cotton (also known as Waxed Cotton) and DMC Cotton Perle/ Pearl Cotton Size 12 works well for doll making.
- **7. Embroidery Cotton/ Floss** in your choice of colours for the eyes and mouth.
- **8. Sewing Needles** a set of Birch Sculpting Needles for Dolls (in particular we need the 127mm needle for the eyes and mouth).
- Quilt Basting Needles (these are very long thin sharp needles and very helpful for doll making).
- A curved needle is useful (but not essential) for embroidering the eves.

#### 9. Scissors & Pins

**10. Sewing Machine (& cotton thread for the machine in the colour of your dolls skin)** to make the body, arms & legs. If you don't have access to a sewing machine it is possible to backstitch these by hand, but please note this will take extra time.

#### 11. Optional - Cotton fabric to make clothes

## about the materials

**Tricot** is the traditional material used to make Steiner/Waldorf dolls. It is cotton Interlock - when you look closely at the fabric you will see vertical lines and when you pull side ways you will feel its stretch. This is usually sold in a tube, which means you get a double layer, which you will find out is perfect for cutting out the patterns.

### about the materials

**Tricot** is the traditional material used to make Steiner/Waldorf dolls. You can also use upcycled materials from around your home such as any old clothes made from a cotton interlock. Cotton Interlock is a cotton fabric with vertical lines when you look closely at the fabric at the way the fabric is woven gives it a stretch horizontally. I also like to use upcycled/second hand garments (such as singlets/tshirts etc). Use light coloured garments to boil with tea bags or other natural dye stuff to create your desired skin colour.

#### **Wool Stuffing**

When buying wool stuffing for your doll note whether the wool is carded or not.

Carding is a process of brushing wool fibres to create a continuous web of fibres. Carded wool can then be used to form batting, rolled into slivers or rovings and split into spinning wool. Uncarded wool is also fine to use - just make sure that it has been washed and be aware that the wool may be a little clumpy. I find gently pulling the wool apart with your hands to break up any clumps works well to avoid lumps in your dolls body.

#### **Strong Cotton**

Gutermann Quilting Cotton (also known as Waxed Cotton). I like to use this doubled over to tie off the

head and create the neck. I also use this in various colours

for attaching hair.

Middle: DMC Cotton Perle/ Pearl Cotton. Pearl Cotton is a

non-divisable thread (meaning that you can't split the cotton

into strands like you can with embrodiery thread). This is a

good thread to use when tieing off the head and neck as it is

strong and yet can still be threaded through a quilt basting

needle (my favourite needle for doll making). Pearl cotton

comes in different sizes, the higher the size the finer the cotton.

Size 12 works well for doll making.
